


Through many letters, to many parts of the United States and from numerous trips I have made to the Southern states from 1926 to 1939 doing research work in Virginia, North and South Carolina, Georgia, Tennessee, Louisiana, Kentucky, Missouri and Texas I have been able to compile this genealogy and have been most fortunate in contacting many direct descendants. It is not entirely complete, it being difficult to get the lines of the daughters of the families, but this much I now offer to the Lockett heirs.

It has been a very interesting work, although at times classifying some of the records seemed impossible. I am most grateful to all who have helped me. I am indebted to Mrs. Myrta Lockett Avary, author and poetess of Atlanta, Georgia, for her help in compiling the Abner and David Lockett lines. David's line was most difficult because he moved about the Revolutionary time from Virginia to Georgia. I received many David Lockett records supposed to belong to this Thomas Lockett line; I trust those used are correctly placed.

As some of the gentle souls who labored to recall and to write out these connecting links had long passed four score years, I am most appreciative of their efforts.

I also wish to thank Mrs. Laura Davis Scarborough of Texas; Mrs. Locke Walton Marshall of Virginia; Miss Emma J. Lockett of Missouri; Rev. Stephen Southall of Virginia; and the many others who spared no efforts to help with this work. Now I pass this epitome on to you, Thomas Lockett's descendants.

The Thomas Locketts

This memoir relates to Thomas Lockett of Henrico County, Virginia. Thomas Lockett, the first, was born in 1645 and died in 1686. His wife was Margaret, some say Margaret Osborne, but we have no proof of this; neither the will of Thomas, first, March 1, 1686, nor of his wife, Margaret, May 22, 1708, indicates this is the name.

The first Thomas Lockett lived in Henrico County, Virginia, his will was probated there March 27, 1686; from his will and deeds recorded in Henrico county we find that he lived on the Appomattox River, adjoining the land of John Baugh and Pierce.

The second Thomas Lockett lived in Goochland County and his will was recorded there March 18, 1745.

The third Thomas Lockett lived in Cumberland County and his will was recorded there January 23, 1773.

We find the first Thomas lived in Henrico County, the second Thomas in Goochland County, the third Thomas in Cumberland County, but from all records that all three lived and died in the same house. To see how this could be, it is necessary to know about the division of counties. What is now Powhattan county was included in Cumberland County before 1777, and was with Cumberland County included in Goochland County before 1748, and with Cumberland and Goochland Counties included in Henrico County before 1727. Thus the first Thomas Lockett who died in Henrico County, 1686, and the second Thomas Lockett who died in Goochland County, 1745, and the third Thomas Lockett, who died in Cumberland County in 1773, all could have lived and died in what is now Powhattan County. In fact this did happen and from the data we have, we find that the three Thomas Locketts

lived on Butterwood Creek and Appomattox River in Powhattan County. The place is about one mile up the river from the point where the Southern Railroad crosses the river.

It is interesting to note that these early Locketts were planters—that each increased his inheritance by the purchase of more lands. We have no knowledge how much the first Thomas inherited; we assume he inherited the home place "Manor Plantation." From the records we find that only three years before his death he bought from William Farrar and wife Priscilla, a large tract of land on the Appomattox River. We learn from the will of Thomas, first, that he gives to his eldest son Benjamin a place he calls "Scotland Hills"; and to his second son Thomas, the second, his home place "Manor Plantation" and to his third son other lands. This son James must have died without family as we find no other records concerning him.

Thomas, second, increased his holdings; 200 acres he had purchased in Amelia County he wills to Thomas the third, called Thomas, Jr., mentioning this land joins land that Thomas, Jr., had already purchased.

Thomas the third went in for land in a big way. He purchased August 20, 1747, from King George II, 1531 acres in Amelia County and from Powhattan County records he purchased a tract of land with Francis Marshall, 1747. At his death he owned land in Amelia County, Cumberland County, Chesterfield County, and Prince Edward County. These he divided among three of his sons and two of his daughters. To two of his sons, James and David, he leaves no land but mentions all of his children, five sons and four daughters, in the sale of the final residue of his estate.

Stephen Lockett, second son of Thomas Lockett, third, lived on Sailors Creek and the Appomattox River, seven miles or more below old James Town in Prince Edward County. Perkinson and Henry Madison lived lately upon the place.

Stephen also added acres to his inheritance. On April 6, 1769 he purchased from King George III, 1600 acres in Halifax County.

Up to the time of Thomas Lockett the third, the sons and daughters of the Thomas Locketts lived in Virginia, but in Thomas the third's family we find several of his sons moving to other states.

David the third son of Thomas, third, who lived in Buckingham County, Virginia, moved to Warren County, Georgia, about the time of the American Revolution. Dates from the Warren County records show this. Undoubtedly most of his children were born in Virginia but from marriage records his children were married and continued to live in Georgia and adjoining States.

Little is recorded of James, the eldest son of Thomas, third, or of his family. In Louisiana I saw part of an early Thomas Lockett family tree. It must have been made by some of the earlier Locketts, drawn in the form of a tree. The records on it of the first and second Thomas Locketts were quite complete and it contained part of the third Thomas's records. It gave the name of James's wife and their four children. Finding no further records of his family in Virginia he may have been the first to move South. The name James is often used in David's line and I believe some of the records sent to me from descendants thinking they belonged to the David line, belonged to James's line. We hope in another edition this may be cleared up. Why James the eldest son did not inherit the home place is not known, but we do know that it was left to Stephen, the second son.

We find descendants of Abner, the fifth son of Thomas, third, settled both in Kentucky and Georgia, but it is not until the second and third generations that we find any court records for them in these states.

Jacob, youngest son of Thomas, third, must have moved

early to Georgia. We find his oldest daughter's marriage recorded in Sumpter County, Georgia, and others of his children's marriages recorded in Stewart and Baldwin County, Geogia. Jacob's family must have been in contact with his older brother David's, for we find their grandchildren marrying: Lucy Sarah Bridges, daughter of Sallie Lockett and granddaughter of Jacob marrying her cousin Ben Lockett, son of James Lockett and grandson of David Lockett.

Osborne Lockett, the second son of Stephen Lockett, inherited the home place and all his children were born there; he and his wife Agnes died there. Osborne and Agnes Lockett were large, fine looking people, they lived well and both died suddenly. Osborne studied law under Chief Justice Marshall but never practiced it. His great interest was in farming.

Osborne Lockett raised cattle, wheat, corn, and cotton. He owned boats which plied on the Appomattox River from old James Town (which was a town then north of Farmville) to Petersburg. These he used for his own use as well as hauling for other people.

Osborne owned vast acres, many different farms on which he had mills to grind the wheat and corn; he also had a large cotton gin and owned many slaves. Part of this old Lockett place is now a mecca for tourists; a monument is there to mark the place of the battle of Sailor Creek.

The descendants of Thomas Lockett are scattered from the Atlantic to the Pacific and from Massachusetts to Texas. Thus the builders push on. Many of these have done well for the name and their records stand to honor it.

Many of the Thomas Locketts' descendants continue to live in Virginia. The first five generations of the Locketts were land owners and planters. From the beginning they acquired more and more land. The will of Osborne Lockett of Prince Edward County, Virginia, reads like dividing large counties into sections. Some of the descendants continue to till the soil but many have become lawyers, doctors, engineers, professors, ministers and teachers. Osborne Lockett was the last large land owner in Virginia.

George Washington Lockett, the oldest son of Osborne and Agnes Branch Lockett, was one of the two sons who continued throughout their lives as planters. George inherited from his father vast acres of land situated on the west side of Sailors Creek and on the south side of Appomattox; this was part of the old home place. He carried on successfully this large plantation, until the call of the wild, "go west," filled him with a desire for newer fields.

Thus he sold his plantation and moved in 1840 to Missouri. This was a very exciting trip; there were few roads and fewer bridges. The wagon beds were so attached to the running gear of the wagons that in fording the streams the wagon beds would float thus greatly aiding the crossing of streams. A young hound dog, a family favorite, was taken along on the trip and his mother was left behind. After several weeks sojourn the dog disappeared. Months later in Missouri they learned the dog had arrived safely back on the Virginia plantation.

George settled in Missouri on the Osage River. Here he purchased a large farm, cultivated over one thousand acres. He had brought from Virginia a large family of Negro slaves (his property by inheritance). These slaves were made useful to the family by kind treatment—they learned to know they had always a good home, plenty to eat, good clothes and a happy life. When the slaves were set free it was a great loss to George and family; in money value a loss of twenty thousand dollars. This loss was heavily felt. It became a difficult task, with the lack of labor, to keep in active cultivation his vast acres; and a constant worry to keep sufficient hands at work

on his farm to save the crops and to make enough to pay the heavy taxes on his large estate. All of this bore heavily upon him and hastened his death.

He was a great advocate of education, giving his children the best the time afforded. He was a staunch Baptist and had an important part in building up the West, as Missouri was then considered. He has left behind him sons and grandsons carrying on the high principles of the early Virginia Locketts.

James Stephen Lockett was the other son of Osborne who continued in Virginia throughout his life a planter. He inherited from his father a large plantation with mill for grinding wheat and corn, also a cotton gin and sawmill. He had many tobacco-drying houses. His chief crops were tobacco, wheat and corn; besides these he raised fine horses and cows. For over fifty years he continued successfully on his plantation and today this beautiful old place is being farmed by his grandson.

James was a Baptist, a deacon and superintendent of Sunday school most of his life, giving it up only after he became too feeble to ride his horse to church. Now in his front yard a large granite marker stands, placed there by the Daughters of the Confederacy of Nottoway Chapter, marking the last stand of General Robert E. Lee and honoring the man who carried on the ideals of his forebears.

Some writer has said, "show me a successful man and back of him you will discover a mother or wife who has had an important part in his making." The daughters of the Locketts have lived up to their fathers and brothers' ideals. Recollections of a few of these follow:

Mrs. John M. Graham was Lucy Augusta Strong, the daughter of Lucy Harwood Lockett and Judge C. H. Strong,

and the great, great granddaughter of Abner Lockett of Mecklenburg County, Virginia. She grew up in Georgia, her later home being "The Oaks" at Marietta. She was very active in many clubs of the State.

A member of the D. A. R. almost from its beginning, she was parliamentarian and Honorary State Regent. Her advice was sought by men as well as women. She believed in America, believed in women and women's creative energy. She held many important positions on committees in the National Society of D. A. R. and was a charter member of the National Officers Club. Her remarkable ability, coupled with her loyalty, her strict integrity, her absolute honor and courage placed her in many high positions. Her death in 1924 closed a chapter of another noteworthy Lockett descendant.

Mrs. Napoleon Lockett was Mary Lockett, daughter of Samuel L. Lockett of Mecklenburg County, Virginia. At the thirty-fifth convention of Daughters of the Confederacy meeting at Montgomery, Alabama, the portrait of this beautiful southern woman, Mrs. Napoleon Lockett, was presented to the White House of the Confederacy. This was a special tribute to her memory, as it was she with some others who suggested to Mr. Nicola Marschall that the Confederate White House did not have a flag. Through her efforts the Confederate flag, the Stars and Bars, was made. On March 4, 1861, Mrs. Lockett journeyed by carriage with Mr. Marschall from Marion to Montgomery, where they presented to President Jefferson Davis the Confederate flag which was raised for the first time on the Capitol grounds. Mrs. Lockett was the mother of Samuel Henry Lockett, a noted engineer of the Confederacy.

Lelia Ann Lockett Monnot, daughter of James Stephen Lockett of Prince Edward County, Virginia, was 17 years old the last year of the War between the States. The last battle of this war was fought on her father's plantation at Sailors Creek. Their home was turned into a hospital during these last days where the beautiful young Lelia with her father took care of the wounded and dying soldiers.

A small company of Confederate soldiers was guarding High Bridge, a strategic point near the Lockett plantation, and one of these young soldiers, a Frenchman from Louisiana, came every day to the plantation to get buttermilk. Here he met the lovely Lelia and two years after the close of the war, this young soldier, Ernest L. Monnot came back to Virginia to claim Miss Lelia as his bride. He took her home to his plantation, Elmfield, near Napoleonville, where this grand woman through her services for seventy-two years to family, friends and community carried on the old traditions of the early Virginia Locketts.

In California lived Mary Katherine Lockett Carter, daughter of Thomas Francis Lockett of Prince Edward County, Virginia, later of Cole County, Missouri, known as Miss Mollie. As a very small girl, Miss Mollie during the first years of the war of 1861-65, lived on her grandfather's (Col. Levi Dixon) plantation. The wives, with their children, of the many sons and sons-in-law of Col. Dixon, made his plantation their home while their husbands served in the Confederate Army. One of the duties of the little "Misses" was to knit socks for the soldiers; every day so many yards of yarn were measured off for each; when this amount was knitted the children could play; to keep up their interest at special places goodies were tied into the yarn.

The plantation was eighteen miles out in the country. Many companies of Union soldiers passed by it. Knowing the wealth of Col. Dixon and that his sons were in the Confederate Army, the plantation was continually being searched,

often at night. It was not unusual for the Union soldiers to make the darky mammies take the children out of bed so they could search the bed for valuables. All they ever found were partly knitted socks. The family silver and jewelry was safely buried. These experiences were not very pleasant for little children. In 1864 Miss Mollie experienced going through the Union lines from Missouri to Texas. It was always difficult to get through the lines and often the soldiers were very disagreeable. She told years after of how they pinched her face.

Miss Mollie grew up in Texas, attended Baylor University, and in 1874 as the "Belle of Bosque," married Francis Watkins Carter, of Tennessee, a drummer lad of the Twentieth Tennessee C. S. A. In 1887 she moved with her husband to California. Here she helped to organize the Stonewall Jackson Chapter at San Diego, and while president of the Chapter, through her untiring efforts the beautiful burial plot at Mt. Hope Cemetery was purchased for burial grounds of the Confederate soldiers and their wives. The Mary K. Lockett Carter Chapter, Children of the Confederacy, bears her name, honoring her for the years of service given to the educational, historical and benevolent work of the organization. True to Lockett traditions this daughter of the West has carried on, Non Nobis Solum.


From Osborne and Agnes Scott Lockett's first born, Frances Wilson Lockett, Virginia has been blessed with several generations of noteworthy citizens.

Frances Wilson Lockett was born November 11, 1801 and married November 10, 1815, at the very early age of fourteen years Doctor Phillip Turner Southall. Fair Frances was not to enjoy many years of married life. She died July 25, 1822, at the age of twenty years, leaving behind two fine sons, Stephen Osborne Southall and Phillip Francis Southall.

Stephen Osborne Southall was born at Jamestown, Prince Edward County, Virginia, December 16, 1816. He graduated from Hampden-Sydney College with honor and distinction in 1835. Later he graduated in law from the University of Virginia and was admitted to practice law in Prince Edward County. He was elected from that County in 1852 to the House of Delegates in Virginia and attorney for the Commonwealth, July 1, 1864. In 1866 he was elected professor of law at the University of Virginia, which position he held until his death, November 28, 1884. He never married.

The Richmond Times Dispatch, November 30, 1884, pays this tribute to him:

"The State has lost one of its most accomplished and brilliant men by the death of Stephen Osborne Southall. He was a man of the very first order of intellect, with a wit as rare as that of Charles Lamb and with a familiarity with the English literature hardly equalled by any one whom we have met. He frequently contributed in his early life (for his own amusement) to the columns of the newspapers, articles which for eloquence, logic, and sparkling brilliancy have never been surpassed in Virginia. He was widely known throughout the State and had many friends."

No less in renown do we find the other son of Frances Lockett. Her second son Phillip Francis Southall was born at Jamestown, Prince Edward County, Virginia, April 16, 1822. Later he moved with his father to Amelia, Virginia. Graduating in medicine from Richmond College, he built his home "Woodstook" from which he had an extensive and successful practice in both Amelia and Chesterfield Counties. January 16, 1845, he married Eliza J. Goode, daughter of Col. Robert Goode of Bonnerville, South Carolina. Besides his ardent activities in the field of medicine, he was a zealous student of English literature, a vestryman for fifty years of Trinity Church, Dale Parish, a magistrate and political leader in the Conservative party.

The Richmond Times Dispatch, October 9, 1898, said of him:

"In personal appearance he was a man whom once to see was scarcely to forget. The features in early life which made him the comeliest of a comely family, gave him in age a dignity of presence which was felt by all who knew him. His manners were those of an old Virginia gentleman and as a companion, a guest, a host, and a conversationalist, he was one of the most accomplished men in Southside Virginia."

Dr. Phillip Southall left three sons who have followed in his footsteps in honor and credit to Virginia, the most widely known being Robert Goode Southall.

Robert Southall received his degree of B. L. in 1876 from the University of Virginia. He first practiced law in Amelia; later he was elected Attorney for the Commonwealth; next he was elected to Congress from the Fourth District, serving from 1903 to 1907. He was in 1912 elected judge of the Fourth Judicial Circuit and continued to serve there until his death in 1924. He was a vestryman of Christ Church, Raleigh Parish, Amelia, Virginia. From the Times Dispatch of Richmond, we quote:

"To hundreds of older Virginians, Robert G. Southall was known simply as 'Bob.' The shortened name fitted the simplicity of the man. In him affectation never found a lodging place. Although he had been far more than ordinarily successful, the pompous pride of the lesser man was utterly foreign to his nature. He was cast in a larger mold. He could not help being big of body, mind and heart and being just that he went on through life as he was made, despising the airs which others affected. To thousands of a younger generation he was known as Judge Southall, to whom respect was due and to whom it was accorded in generous measure with delight. To them he was a big, kindly man with a quaint sense of humor; with a cigar that would never stay lighted; a lawyer who knew the statutes by heart and carried them there; a judge whose passion was Justice and whose decisions for years have been taken in Virginia as the last word in judicial opinion; a counselor wise in the ways of the world and a past master in the art of interpreting human nature. A gentleman always, as was his right and nature; that was Judge R. G. Southall in life, that is the memory of him in death."

Thomas Francis, youngest son of Osborne Lockett, was born July 30, 1826. He was the sixth generation born in Virginia. Thomas was named for his oldest brother named Thomas who died in 1803 and his oldest sister Frances, who died in 1826. His early childhood was spent on the family plantation, "Elmwood," Prince Edward County, Virginia, attending the neighborhood schools and in the old fashioned way was taught the primary studies, spelling and defining, reading, writing, arithmetic, geography, and grammar. At the age of fifteen he attended an academy in Clarkville, Mecklenburg County, for three years, and at eighteen entered Richmond College, Richmond, Virginia. Here his studies were mathematics, science, history and literature. He graduated in 1847.

Thomas had no special religious training in his early youth, but by nature was serious and earnest and about the age of fifteen began to make a study of religion. He was then a member of the Baptist Church. On November 14, 1847, he was ordained to preach by the Sandy River Baptist Church; later that year he moved to Missouri and settled in Cole County and here he was elected principal of Osage Institute, where he taught for two years and at the same time preached throughout Cole County.

On May 15, 1848 Thomas F. Lockett married Miss Sallie Waller Dixon, daughter of Col. Levi Dixon of Cole County, a gentleman of high social standing.

William Jewel College at Liberty, Missouri, was chartered February 27, 1849. At its first board meeting November 12, 1849, they elected Rev. Thomas Francis Lockett professor of mathematics. Then Professor Lockett moved from his farm in Cole County to live in Liberty.

Persons acquainted with the history of the early days of Missouri know that the year 1849 marks a period of great development. The incidents and traditions of the settlement and primitive years of the State—the odors of the forest remained fresh and invigorating among the people. The sense of manhood and personal valor energized all. The Mexican War had closed and in it the soldiers of Missouri had won for her unfading laurels. Her citizens felt the swell of emotions at the thought of it and there was peace everywhere.

As yet, however, a man could stand at the southwest border of Clay County and fire a rifle ball across the Missouri river into the Indian country and the adventurous traveler could journey from Missouri towards the setting sun among tribes of Indians as savage as they were a thousand years before, until his steps be arrested by the roar of waves beating on the western shore of America. Into the consciousness of all this, Prof. Lockett, on his arrival in Missouri, entered and like the true man that he was at once became a Missourian in every possible sense.

Prof. Lockett taught besides mathematics, classical geography and history. He was also ingenious in mechanics and had a decided taste for architecture. With his work in the college, he continued his pastoral work. Under this strain his health broke and a few years later he was compelled to resign and return to his farm in Cole County.

Thomas Lockett was in principle and feeling thoroughly a Southern man, so when the War between the States began in 1861, without a moment's delay or hesitation he joined the Southern Army under General Sterling Price and served in the armies of the Confederacy until the close of the war, first as chaplain, then as major. His gift in organization and construction was recognized, and in 1864 General Price detailed him to go to Texas and there construct and operate a factory for making clothes for the use of the Confederate soldiers. He

was engaged in this work in Robinson County, Texas, when the war closed.

He continued to live in Texas. He served on the Board of Baylor University and preached in many parts of the State.

Dr. D. C. Allen, a student under Prof. Lockett at William Jewell, and later president of William Jewel Colege, said of him: "Prof. Lockett was tall, six feet two inches in height. His features were fairly regular, with forehead high and moderately narrow. His dress was more comfortable than stylish. His pronunciation of English was fine, distinct, and clear. He used the word 'sir' in addressing persons, in a tone and way precisely like the old class Virginians—a way and tone indeed, which excelled in courtesy, kindness, ease and dignity anything that I have ever heard in the English speaking world."

To his children and grandchildren Thomas Lockett left a vast store of some of the most interesting and thrilling incidents of the War between the States. As Missouri was a divided State, it was held mostly by the Union Army. Major Lockett slipped through the Union lines many times, having narrow escapes. Because he carried back to his regiment things that were contraband, there was a stake on his life, but his dauntless courage and quick ingenuity saved him many times.

On one occasion when returning to his regiment from his home, with two huge sacks of home-knit socks swung across the back of his saddle he saw a detachment of Union soldiers coming towards him. He could not turn back. In a few minutes they would be close enough to see him. Quickly he dismounted, grabbed the bags of socks and threw them into some thick shrubs; his saddle and blanket he threw into other shrubs; then he led his horse to a ravine, which was too open for him to hide in. Not far from the thick shrubs was an oak tree. To reach it now he must crawl. This he did and climbed up on the back side to the largest limb. It was not over 12 inches

wide but the Major was a long thin man, with his hands stretched over his head he snuggled to the limb. The searching squad came to the tree, stood under it and discussed where he could have gone. They rested about an hour, then rode away out of sight. Major Lockett climbed down, whistled for his horse, pulled out of the brambles his saddle and bags of socks and rode away to his regiment.

Thomas Francis Lockett as professor and minister for over fifty years left behind him footprints on the early history of Missouri and Texas.


Samuel Henry Lockett was born July 6, 1837, in Mecklenburg County, Virginia. His father and mother, Napoleon and Mary Clay Lockett, were double first cousins and moved to Marion, Perry County, Alabama, when he was an infant.

At the age of sixteen, Samuel Lockett graduated from Howard College. Later he entered West Point and after winning great scholarly distinction was graduated second in the class of 1859 and was promoted in the U. S. Army as second lieutenant in the corps of Engineers.

December of that year he married Miss Cornelia Clark of West Point. He was next honored by being selected as an assistant Professor at the Military Academy. He served under General Whiting as his assistant in engineering work in the Eight Light House District, which extended from Charleston, South Carolina to Fernandina, Florida.

Upon the withdrawal of Alabama from the Union, Lieutenant Lockett promptly resigned his commission and accepted an appointment as Major of Engineers, tendered him by the Governor of Alabama, and was placed in charge of important defenses of Mobile Bay and Pensacola Harbor. March 7, 1861, he was commissioned Captain of Engineers in the Confederate States Army. Later General Bragg took Captain Lockett with him to North Mississippi where in March, 1862, he laid out and constructed the defenses of Corinth, Mississippi. He served in the Shiloh campaign as Chief Engineer of the Bragg Corps. The Chief Engineer of the Army, Major General J. F. Gilmer, was wounded early in action and Captain Lockett became the Chief Engineer of the Army upon the staff of General Albert Sidney Johnston, until that distinguished commander fell mortally wounded. next served under General Beauregard, giving valiant service. For this he was promoted to the rank of Major of Engineers.

Major Lockett designed and constructed the defenses of Vicksburg and the adjacent strategic points of Chickasaw Bluff, Haines' Bluff and Yazoo City on the north and Warrenton on the south of Vicksburg.

In November 1862, under General J. C. Pemberton, Major Lockett became Chief Engineer of the Department of Mississippi, Alabama and East Louisiana. He planned and constructed the defenses of Port Hudson, Louisiana; of Jackson, Mississippi; of Fort Pemberton, Mississippi, and many other points of minor interest; for his services during this campaign he was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant Colonel of Engineers. One month after being captured at Vicksburg he was exchanged and reported to General Joseph E. Johnson, again resuming his duties as Chief Engineer of the Department of Alabama, Mississippi and East Louisiana.

During the campaign when General Sherman, United States Army, and General Joseph E. Johnson, Confederate States Army, contended for the possession of Mississippi and Louisiana, Col. Lockett bore a most prominent part and for these distinguished services he was promoted to the rank of Colonel of Engineers and placed in command of the third Regiment of Confederate Engineer Corps. He conducted the defense of Mobile, Alabama, 1864 to 1865 and earned a lasting and enviable reputation as a military engineer of the highest order. With these operations came the termination of four years of bloody and eventful war. Though less than twenty-eight years of age Colonel Lockett had achieved a great reputation as a brave soldier and skillful engineer. With such a record behind him, he could with pride lay down a sword which he had upheld for four years with honor. May, 1865, Colonel Lockett surrendered and returned to Marion, Alabama, where he occupied the chair of Mathematics and Natural Sciences at Judson Institute.

From January, 1867 to 1873, Colonel Lockett was Professor of Mechanics and Engineering in the State University of Louisiana. From 1874 to 1875 he was president of a college in Alabama.

June, 1875, Colonel Lockett was appointed Colonel of Engineers in the Army of the Khedive of Egypt and on his arrival at Cairo was made Chief of the Third Section of the General Staff (Topographical Bureau) of the Egyptian Army. As in the Confederate Army his services in the Egyptian campaign earned for him the highest commendations from the Egyptian government for his very valuable scientific and engineering work. In 1877 he resigned this commission and accepted the professorship of Engineering and Mechanics at the University of Tennessee.

In 1888 he was sent to Chile, where he secured for the North and South American Construction Company, a twenty million dollar railroad contract. He made three voyages to the United States of Columbia as an expert in his line of engineering. He was appointed by that Government as Chief Engineer in the construction of a system of waterworks and while engaged in this work he died after a short illness at Bogota, Columbia, on October 12, 1891, at the age of 54.

LOCKETT WILLS

Will of Thomas Lockett (First) Will Book, 1677-1692, page 367

Recorded in Henrico County, Virginia, June 1st, 1686

The first mention of Locketts in Henrico reads as follows:

"I, Thomas Osborne do assign all my right of the transportation of Abe Wood unto Thomas Lockett" this is dated February 5, 1667. Again November 5th, 1667, Thomas Osborne assigned a head right to Thomas Lockett. Thomas Lockett in 1682 was a witness to the will of Richard Ward.

"Will.

"I, Thomas Lockett of the Parish of Bristol in the County of Henrico, being weak in body but of perfect memory make and ordain my last will and testament in manner form following.

"Witz: I count my soul to Almighty God that gave it and my body to be decently buryed at ye discretion of my wife and she to be my sole executor of this my last will and testament—

"First Imp. I give unto my oldest son Benjamin Lockett all the land between the spring and the Deep Buttom joining Peirles to the creek, called lately Scotland Hills and his heirs forever.

"2nd. I give and bequeath unto James Lockett and Thomas Lockett the land I now live on to be divided, my son Thomas the Plantation I now live on and to his heirs forever, beginning at the River and South by the old tobacco house and up the hill, there taking the path as far as the land goeth.

"Imp. 3rd. I give and bequeath to my son James Lockett to his part and his heirs forever—beginning at the lower landing so taking a direct course by the old tobacco house being north and next the creek and so to a Pohicory, a marked tree on the line and have its breadth to a shooting hole and along the creek to him and his heirs forever.

"In the name of God Amen—the 22 day of May 1708, I Margaret Lockett of the Parish of Bristoll in the County of Henrico, being sick and weak in body but of sound mind and memory, Pleased be Almighty God, Do make and ordaine, constitute and appoint this my last will and testament in manner following, first and principally I recommend my soul to God that gave it to me hoping through the merits and mediations of Jesus Christ my Redeemer to have full pardon and Remission of all my sins in full and certain hope of a joyful Resurrection

at the last day and my body to the earth from whence it was taken, to be buried in such decent manner as my executors hereafter shall think fit and convenient, and for such worldly estate as it hath Pleased God of his Infinite Goodness to bestow upon me, I give and bequeath that as forthwith (Witz.)

"Imp. 1st. I give and bequeath unto my daughter Elizabeth Standly, one feather bed and boulster, being the same which I usually lye on, with one Blanket and one cow commonly called Duckey with whatever she shall increase after my Decease to her and her heirs forever.

"Item—I give and bequeath to my sons Benjamin and Thomas Lockett and my daughters Susan Griggs and Mary Mitchell to each and every one of them one shilling sterling to be paid by my executors hereafter named—all the rest of my estate of what nature or quality soever I give and bequeath to my son James Lockett and do make him whole and sole executor of this my last will and Testament. Hereby Revoaking all other wills by me made. In witness where of I have here to set my hand and affixed my seal the day and year above written.

"I give and bequeath to my beloved son Thomas Lockett two hundred acres of land in Amelia County on Falling Creek —beginning at the plant, back to him and his heirs forever the other two hundred acres he purchased of Edward Harris it being entry—

"Item—I give and bequeath to my beloved son Joel, all the land I now hold on north side of Butler Wood Creek, excepting 4 acres between the bridge, to him and his heirs for ever.

"Item—I give and bequeath to my beloved son Gideon, the Maner plantation where on I now live and four acres on the north side of the said Creek below the bridge to him and his heirs forever.

"Item—I give and bequeath to my beloved son in law, Paiyn Allday, 100 acres of land being near Skin Quarter Creek joining Moseley and Worty and also one cow and calf to him and his heirs forever.

"Item—I give and bequeath to my beloved daughter Hannah 2 cows, one horse and saddle, the horse to be between 5 and 10 years old.

"Item—I give Lucy one cow and calf and I give my wife six cattle, and the rest of the stock to be divided between Joel and Gideon, and all the house hold, only one bed for my daughter Hannah. Lastly I institute and appoint Joel Lockett, Arthur Mosely and Creed Haskins executors of this my last will and Testament to which I have set my hand and fixed my seal this thirteenth day of November in the year of our Lord Christ 1745.

"In the name of God—Amen—I, Thomas Lockett of the County of Cumberland being sick and weak of body but in perfect mind and memory do make this my last will and testament in manner and form following—to wit.

"Imf. I give and bequeath to my son Stephen Lockett all my said land in Prince Edward County on the South side of Harris Creek to the main road to him and his heirs forever.

"Item—I give and bequeath to my son Abner Lockett the land whereon I now live to him and his heirs forever—

"Item—I give and bequeath to my son Jacob all my land on Nut Tree branch in Chesterfield County to him and his heirs forever, if he shall arrive to the age of 21 years, if not I desire the land to be sold to the highest bidder and the money to be equally divided amongst all my children, as also I give him 15 pounds of current money, one feather bed and furniture, a horse bridle and sadle, of ten pounds value.

"Item—I give and bequeath to my daughter Martha Bass, all my land on the north side of Harris Creek from the cross line of my son Stephen to the upper line, to her and her heirs forever.

"Item—I give and bequeath to my daughter Lucy Stone all the land on the South side of the North fork of Falling Creek as also twenty acres of the North side beginning at the cabin line, thence up the creek to include the twenty acres to her and her heirs forever.

"Item—I give and bequeath to my daughter Elizabeth Lockett one feather bed and furniture and fifteen pounds current money. "Item—I give and bequeath to my daughter Mary Gipson one feather bed and furniture and fifteen pounds current money.

"Item—I give my well beloved wife Judith Lockett thirty pounds current money, if she will relinquish her right of my estate. It is my desire that all the land I hold in Prince Edward County not already willed away be sold and the money equally divided amongst all my children except my son James Lockett. It is further my desire that all the rest of my estate of every nature and kind whatsoever both real and personal be equally divided amongst all my children, that is to say James, Stephen, David, Abner and Jacob Lockett, Martha Bass, Lucy Stone, Mary Gipson, Elizabeth Lockett. I also desire my estate may not be appraised and lastly I do constitute and appoint my son Stephen Lockett, Abner Lockett and Arthur Moseley executors of this my last will and testament hereby revoking all other wills by me formerly made. In witness whereof I have here unto set my hand and affixed my seal this Twenty-eight day of September Anno dom, one thousand seven hundred and seventy (1770)

And on the motion of the said executors who made oath according to law certificate is granted them for obtaining a probate thereof in due form given security—where upon they together with Arthur Moseley and Gideon Lockett their securities entered into and ac-

knowledge bond according to law and liberty is reserved to the other executor to join in probate.

Will of Joel Lockett

Cumberland County, Virginia, Book No. 1

"In the name of God amen I, Joel Lockett of the County of Cumberland being brought to the remembrance of my mortallity and the fraility of this temporal life by the gracious hand of Almighty God visiting me with sickness yet of perfect memory praised be God therefore I make and ordain this my last will and testment in manner and form following, viz.

"First and principally I resign my soul to God that gave it to me in hopes of his acceptance through the merits and mediation of his beloved son my Lord and Savour Jesus Christ and my body to the earth from whence it was formed to be entered in such manner as my hereafter executors shall think fit and as for such worldly goods where with all it has pleased God to bless me with in this life—I give, demis and dispose of, in the following manner.

"Item—I lend my well beloved wife, Mary Lockett, the use of my negro girl Sal during her widowhood, then said Sal and increase to be equally divided amongst my four sons, Royal, Pleasant, Daniel and Benjamin Lockett. If my youngest son shall be then 20 years of age, if not she, Sal, shall be kept with the rest of the estate and shall be divided with the rest of my negroes, hereafter mentioned, to the said 4 boys—as also I give my wife 40 schillings a year to be paid by my executors out of the money that is raised by the crops for her own use, during her widowhood.

"Item—I give and bequeath to my daughter, Fannie Hankley, one feather bed.

"Item—I give and bequeath to my son Benjamin Lockett,

the land and plantation that I now live on when he shall arrive to the age of 20 years, to him and his heirs forever.

"Item—My will and desire is that my wife and children may live together on my said plantation, till my youngest son to the age of 20 years and that my whole estate both real and personal should be continued on the said plantation. To raise my children and my will and desire is that my executors lend out all the money that can or shall be raised by the crops made on the plantation at interest, excepting the 40 schillings a year to my wife till my youngest son Benjamin shall arrive to the age of 20 years, then said money to be equally divided amongst my two youngest daughters, Mary Lockett and Elizabeth Lockett, if they are then living, if not both living my desire is that the surviving one have the whole money—and as for the rest of my estate both real and personal that is not yet given away I desire it may be equally divided amongst my four sons—Royal, Pleasant, Daniel and Benjamin, or such of them as shall be then living to be devided by any three men that they shall choose, as also my will and desire is that my sons Royal, Pleasant, Daniel and Benjamin shall and may be free and then own men at the age of 20 years. I also desire that my estate may not be appraised, lastly I institutate and appoint Thomas Mosely, James Hankley and my son Royal Lockett my executors of this my last will and testment. In witness thereof I have set by hand and fixed my seal this 21st day of Sept., 1768-

"In the name of God Amen, I Stephen Lockett of Prince Edward County being at this time of sound mind and perfect memory (all glory be to God for his distinguishing goodness) do make and publish this my last will and testament in the manner and form following and do hereby revoke and disavowal all former wills of whatever tenor or date by me heretofore made.

"Imprimis: I lend to my beloved wife Mary Lockett during her natural life two hundred acres of land on the west side of Sailors Creek in the aforesaid Co. of Prince Edward to be taken off by a line running from the River Appomatox to Shepherds line beginning at a Hickory and two black oaks at the mouth of a gut. Three negroes viz. Jude and her two sons, Lewis and Gaac—one horse and at the time hereafter named a childs part of the stock and in liew of her dower etc.

"Item—I give and bequeath unto my daughter Lucy Townes Bibb two negroes, Seppen and Elaiz, the money lent to John Bibb and the stock and house hold furniture which was lent them, to her and her heirs forever.

"Item—I will and desire that my slaves and such a part only of my stock as may be by my executors hereafter named be thought requisite to be kept on the plantation where I now live and the produce of their labours after the decent support of my surviving family and the education on my children and paying my just debts at the period hereafter mentioned be equally divided between my children, Lucy Towns Bibb excepted, my wife to have the part above mentioned.

"Item—I give and bequeath unto my son Osborne Lockett all my lands lying on the west side of Sailors Creek in Prince Edward Co. to him and heirs forever.

"Item—I give and bequeath unto my son Edmund Lockett all my lands lying on the east side of Sailors Creek in Prince Edward Co. to him and his heirs forever.

"Item—I give and bequeath unto my two sons Henry Wilson Lockett and Samuel Lockett all my lands lying and situated in Halifax County to them and their heirs forever to be equally divided between them, but if either should die without heir, before he comes of lawful age then it is my desire that the said land should be to the survivor alone and his heirs forever. And if they should both die before they come to lawful age or without heirs as before, then the said land shall be divided equally among all my children then living.

"Item—I will and desire that on the 25th of December 1794, or before if my debts are discharged, my slaves, stocks of every kind, household furniture and whatever money shall be at interest or saved after maintaining and supporting my family and paying my debts may be equally divided between all my children (Lucy Townes Bibb, excepted) my beloved wife having the part befor directed, Osborne Lockett, Edmund Lockett, Henry Wilson Lockett, Patty Lockett, Samuel Lockett,

Polly Lockett, share and share alike to them and their heirs forever—but if any of these said children should die before they become of lawful age or without an heir, then their share shall be equally divided amongst all my surviving children.

"Item—I will and desire that at the death of my beloved wife Mary Lockett the personal part of the estate lent to her be equally divided between all my children (Lucy Towns Bibb excepted)

"Item—I hereby nominate and appoint my beloved wife afore named and my two sons, Osborne and Edmund Lockett executors of this my last will and testament and desire that such of the stock and other perishable part of my estate as they find can be spared may be by them sold to the best advantage and reserved as before directed. In testamony of this being my last will and testament I have here unto set my hand and affixed my seal this eleventh day of December in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and ninety (1790)

Will of Osborne Lockett, of Prince Edward County, Virginia Will recorded in Prince Edward County, Virginia.

"Item: I give and bequeath unto my son George Washington Lockett all my track of land lying on the west side of Sailors Creek and South side of Appomattox, to have possession of the West part of it, according to the line laid down in the plot made by Booker Foster, commencing at a Cotton wood tree on the river bank and running in a straight line to the gate on the edge of the woods, thence along the

road to the outer-gate; as soon as he arrives at the age of 21 years and the balance at his mothers death.

"2nd. I give and bequeath unto my son James Stephen Lockett the tract of land bought of Thomas Ellington (except that part here in after devised to be sold with the mill) when he arrives to the age of 21 years but should he not live to that age or leave lawful issue to inherit it, the tract of land shall be sold and divided among my other children as hereafter directed.

"Item: I give and bequeath unto my son Thomas Francis Lockett my tract of land called Poe's tract, except that part laid off by Booker Foster by a line running from the Hackberry gate to Cow-skin branch and except 50 acres laid off by a line running from the Hack-berry gate to the public road, when he arrives at the age of 21 years, but should he not live to that age or leave lawful issue to inherit the tract of land, it shall be sold and divided among my other children, as hereafter directed.

"4th: I give and bequeath unto my son Benjamin F. Lockett two hundred acres of land more or less lying on the east side of Sailors Creek and bounded by the creek on the west, by P. L. Ligon on the north, by a line running from the Hack-berry gate to the public road on the East side and by Perkinsons line on the South, when he shall arrive at the age of 21 years—But should he not arrive to that age or leave lawful issue to inherit, the tract of land shall be sold and divided amongst my other children as here after directed.

"5th.—I give and bequeath to my daughter Elizabeth Ligon and her heirs that part of Poe's tract of land laid off by Booker Foster adjoining P. L. Ligon's land, containing about 16 acres.

"6th.—I do here by direct and authorize my executors to sell my houses and lots in James town and my mill on Sailor Creek with the land on the south side of the Creek and on the north side of the fence, which now runs from Allen Smiths line to Richardson Nobles on Towns branch, as soon as it can be conveniently done with so much of the stock of horses, cows, sheep and hogs as can be conveniently spared with the crop on land and provisions laid in, not necessary for the use of the family and apply the proceeds to the payments of my just debts and also collect the debts due me for the afore said purpose.

"7th.—It is my will and desire that my executors give or lend unto each of my daughters now unmarried a portion of my personal estate equal to that advanced to my daughter already married whenever they marry or become of age.

"8th.—I give unto each of my grandsons Stephen and Philip Southall one hundred dollars each to be paid to them when they severally arrive to the age of 21 years and do hereby exclude them from any part or portion of my estate, both personal and real and in case of death of one of my grandsons, the other shall inherit his part and in case of the death of both before they arrive to the age of 21 years, the afore said \$200.00 shall be taken and held as part of my estate.

"9th.—It is my will and desire that my estate shall be kept together for the maintenance of my wife and children (except as here to fore devised to be sold or given off) until my son George arrives to the age of 21 years—on the death of my wife if that should happen before or her marriage that upon the happening of either of these events, my estate shall be divided among my children now living or their issue, in case of the death of either of them in the following manner—Wiz—that each of my daughters shall bring the value of their advancement into the division and have an equal share of my personal estate with my sons.

"10th.—It is my will that the tract of land devised to my son George W. Lockett shall not be divided or sold should he die before he arrives at the age of 21 years or has lawful issue —but that my son James S. Lockett shall take it under the devise to George and give up that tract of land devised to him—the said James S. Lockett's to be sold and the proceeds to be divided according to the direction of that part of the personal estate in my will and in event of James S. Lockett's death before he arrives at 21 years or has lawful issue, Benjamine Lockett shall take it under the like terms and in case of his death before he arrives at the age of 21 years or has lawful issue, Thomas F. Lockett shall take it upon the same conditions.

"11th.—I lend unto my wife that part of my land lying between Sailor Creek and the lot devised to George W. Lockett, also the following slaves—viz—Judy, Charley, Mary, Silma, Aggy, John, Danill and Ceasar—one half of the household and all the kitchen furniture, also one third part of the money arrising from the sale of the other personal estate after the payment of my just debts during her life and after her death, the slaves and personal estate loaned her to be equally divided between my daughters and their heirs.

"12th.—It is my will and desire that my personal estate shall be equally divided between my sons and daughters except that portion loaned to my wife—which at her death shall be exclusively and equally divided between my daughters and their heirs.

"13th.—It is my will and desire that the guardian of my 3 youngest boys should rent out their land annually until they severally become of age and apply proceeds thereof to their education, clothing, maintenance etc.

"14th.—I appoint my son George and my wife executors to carry this will into effect and force. Signed with my own hand and acknowledged this fourteenth day of November One Thousand eight hundred and thirty four (1834)

October 17, 1836, the last will and testament of Osborne Lockett deceased was presented into court and proved by the oaths of Stephen Shepherd and Thomas C. Overton two witnesses thereto.—ordered that same be recorded at a Court held for said County November 21, 1836—on the motion of George W. Lockett executor herein named, he with Thomas E. Perkinson, Pascal L. Ligon, Thomas B. McGehee, Thomas L. Morton, Stephen C. Lockett, John A. Lockett, Thomas C. Overton, his securities entered into and acknowledge their bond for the purpose in the penalty of fifty-five thousand dollars additional according to the law and took oath required by law, certified for obtaining a probate thereof in due form is granted him.

DATA OF SCOTT FAMILY

From the different records received from descendants of James Scott taken from Scott, Leigh and other old Bibles and court records, we find from one of the earliest Bible records the birth of Thomas Scott, 1718, father of James Scott. The James Scott whose family record is given above may not be the son of this Thomas Scott, but could be either the son or grandson. Pages were often missing in these old Bibles and one has to piece the data together.

In another part of this old Bible in a totally different handwriting are the records of the birth of some slaves. These must have been recorded by the first James Scott for Thomas was born in 1718 and was only four years old when the record began. The dates are on different pages and are a curiosity in these days. The handwriting changes at the eighteenth line (1745), someone else takes up the pen and the old fashioned "ye" for "the" is given up. It is the same writing as that of the will, I dare say the son took up where the father left off. The writing is older and more defaced than that of the will,

which was not written until 1773. The Bible was printed at Oxford, England in 1718. It is very large and contains besides the Old and New Testaments, the Prayer book. One back of the Bible is gone. The Scotts were Episcopalians.

From the Leigh Bible we find that Mrs. Agnes Branch Scott Lockett departed this life December 27, 1839, suddenly. She went to bed well and was found dead the next morning in her bed. She was the twin sister to Elizabeth A. Scott Leigh.

CAPT. JAMES SCOTT, REVOLUTIONARY SERVICE

James Scott, Gentleman Justice of Prince Edward County, Virginia, during years 1771 inclusive to 1776. Captain James Scott 1775 to 1776 on pay roll of Captain John Hayes of the Ninth Regiment of Virginia Forces, commanded by Colonel George Mathew for the 7th of May, 1776—Pay roll in July 1777.

Affidavit of Horace Adams, clerk of Circuit Court of Prince Edward County, Virginia:

"I, Horace Adams, clerk of Circuit Court of Pr. Ed. Co., Va., do hereby certify that as clerk of the aforesaid Court, I have in legal custody all of the Court records of Prince Edward Co., Va., since the organization of the County in the year 1754; that I have examined the record book wherein are recorded the proceedings of the County Court (held by its "Gentleman Justices" of that period) and find that it appears of record during the years 1771 to 1776 inclusive that James Scott was present and presided as a Gentleman Justice at such Court at various terms during the year.

JAMES SCOTT'S WILL

"In the name of God Amen, I, James Scott, of the County of Prince Edward, being sick in body but of perfect mind and memory do make and ordain this to be my last will and testament in manner and form following—I desire that my just debts may be punctually paid by my executors hereafter named.

"Item—I give and bequeath unto my son Thomas Scott forty acres of land more or less lying and being in the county of Prince Edward and adjoining his old tract of land bounded by the lines of John Rudd, William Scott and my own together with the property I heretofore gave him which is now in his possession, to him and his heirs forever:

"Item—I give and bequeath unto my daughter Frances B. Jones one dollar current money of Virginia, together with the property heretofore given her by me, which is now in her possession to her and her heirs forever:

"Item—I give and bequeath to my son William Scott, one negro boy, named Baston together with the property heretofore given him by me which is now in his possession to him and his heirs forever:

"Item—I give and bequeath to my son Samuel Scott one negro boy, named Aaron, together with the property heretofore given him by me which is now in his possession to him and his heirs forever:

"Item—I give and bequeath to my daughter Agnes B. Lockett one dollar current money of Virginia together with the property heretofore given her by me which is now in her possession to her and her heirs forever:

"Item—I give and bequeath unto my daughter Elizabeth A. Leigh one dollar current money of Virginia together with the property heretofore given her by me which is now in her possession to her and her heirs forever:

"Item—I give and bequeath to my son James Scott half of the tract which I now live on and which is as yet not given away, together with one half of my dwelling and out houses, his aforesaid half of the land bounded by the lines of George Owen, Nathaniel Jackson and William Scott and at the death or marriage of my wife Elizabeth, my will and desire is that my said son James should have the remainder of my tract of land whereon I now live, also I give him, my son James, the half of my household and kitchen furniture and one half of my stock of every kind and one half of my plantation utensils, I also give him the following negroes named Will, Affrica, and Moses, of my own stock of negroes also Cate, Booker, Irish, Nancy, and Patt together with their increase, which last mentioned negroes came by his mother to him and his heirs forever; but should my son James die without lawful heir or heirs, it is my will that the tract of land I have given him be equally divided between my two sons William and Samuel or their lawful heirs and the other estate which I have given my said son James I desire may be equally divided between my son Thomas and my two daughters Agnes B. Lockett and Elizabeth A. Leigh or their legal representatives.

"Item—I lend unto my beloved wife Elizabeth Scott the other half of my tract of land not heretofore bequeathed on which I now live, also one half of my dwelling and out houses, one half of my household and kitchen furniture, one half of my stock of every kind, one half of my plantation utensils, also the following negroes David, Jeffres, Jack, Aggy, Nelly, Dick, Frank, Lucy, and Lilley and their increase, and all and every other property which I have during the life or widowhood of my wife Elizabeth and after her death or marriage I desire that all the negroes and personal estate lent to my wife should be equally divided between my children, Thomas Scott, William Scott, Samuel Scott, Agnes B. Lockett, Elizabeth A. Leigh and James Scott to them and their heirs forever: Lastly

I constitute and appoint my son William Scott, and my friends Osborne Lockett and John Rudd executors of this my last will and Testament, in witness whereof I have herewith set my hand and affixed my seal this 3rd day of February, 1805.
